## THE RESIDENTIAL BOARDING SCHOOL STORY

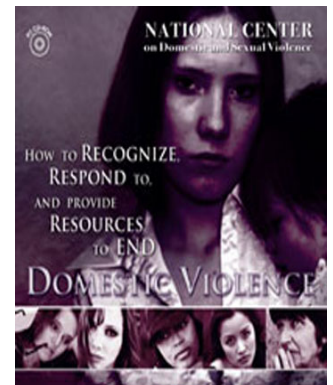
Renee Garcia & Joan Knies recently attended CARE's 9<sup>th</sup> Annual Multicultural Gathering, "Envision A World Without Sexual Violence" at Oak Hill Mansion in Carmel.

One of the presenters was Rosemary Gibbons. She showed her documentary, which won award at the 2003 San Francisco American Indian Film Festival, on 'A Century of Genocide in the Americas: The Residential School Experience.' We now have this dvd in our library.

She told the story that during the 19th and 20th centuries, American Indian, Alaskan Native & Canadian children were forcibly abducted from their homes to attend Christian boarding schools as a matter of government policy. Sexual, physical, and emotional violence was rampant in many of these schools. As a result of boarding school policies, there is now an epidemic of child sexual abuse in many Native communities. However, because of the shame attached to the abuse, there has been no forum to adequately address this problem. Consequently, child abuse passes from one generation to the next. This project is a starting point to address child sexual abuse. By framing abuse as the continuing effects of human rights abuses perpetrated by government policy, we hope to take the shame away from talking about the abuse and provide space for communities to address the problem and heal.

The Boarding School Healing Project, a coalition of several organizations around the country, seeks to document Native boarding school abuses so that Native communities can begin healing from boarding school abuses and demand justice. This project will entail the following components: HEALING, EDUCATION, DOCUMENTATION, and ACCOUNTABILITY.

**WHERE I STOPPED –  
 REMEMBERING AN ADOLESCENT RAPE**

We recently added the book, "Where I Stopped – Remembering An Adolescent Rape" by Martha Ramsey to our library.

Ramsey provides a compassionate rendering of Martha the young girl as she lives through rape and its repercussions and of Martha the adult as she confronts the meaning of her memories. The reader experiences Martha's struggles to cope with her family's reactions, her task of testifying in an open courtroom, and her effort to understand the rapist's act. The book conveys both the peculiar way the psyche resists knowing what it has suffered from sexual abuse and what it is like to uncover the truth. **It is essential reading for anyone who wishes to gain a deeper understanding of the nature of rape, how to come to terms with it, and how to find help.**

Of, relating to, involving, or characteristic of sex, sexuality, the sexes, or the sex organs and their functions.

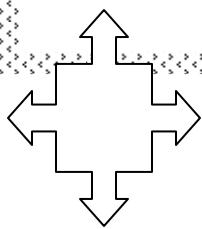
**Violence (n.)**

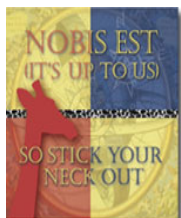

# STOP VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

## Did You Know?

*Literacy – 68% of the world's illiterate people are women.*

*Property Ownership – Women only own 1% of the land in the world.*

*Politics - Worldwide, only about 14% of members of parliament are women. 7% of the world cabinet ministers are women.*

*Poverty – 2.5 billion people (of the world's 6 billion people) are defined 'poor', that is living on less than US \$2 a day. 70% of the world's poor are women.*

*HIV/AIDS – Today, young women are 1.6 times more likely to be living with HIV than young men, largely because of promiscuous men. Every minute, five young people between the ages of 15 and 24 are infected with HIV, three-quarters of them female.*

*Female Genital Cutting – An estimated 1.35 million of the world's females have undergone genital cutting (or, by many accounts, mutilation), and two million girls a year are at risk – apx. 6,000 per day. It is practiced extensively in Africa and is common in some countries in the Middle East.*

*Domestic Violence and Rape – In 141 countries, marital rape is a legal activity.*
